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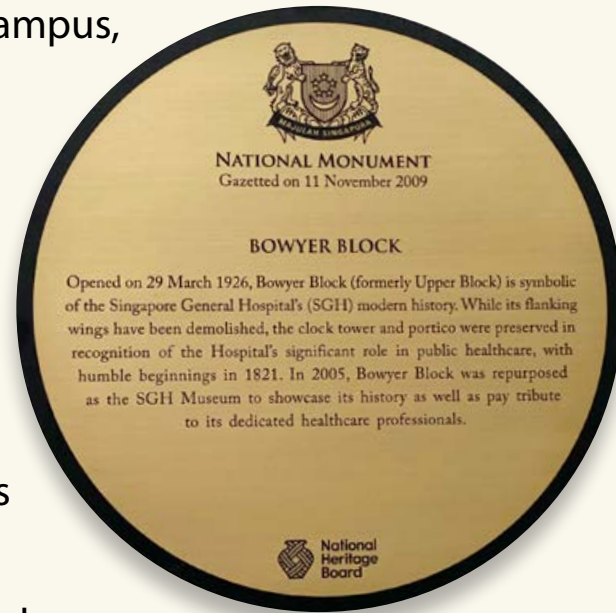
Located in the heart of SGH Campus, the SGH Museum is housed in the Bowyer Block, an iconic architectural landmark gazetted a national monument in 2009.

The SGH Museum is a repository of medical artefacts and records where visitors can relate with the long and rich history of Singapore General Hospital (SGH), learn about the development of medical specialties and get an insight into SGH's significant contributions and impact on Singapore's healthcare through the years. The revamped SGH Museum offers visitors an experiential journey beyond the physical displays and exhibits where more content is available in the digital space accessible through call-to-action QR codes.

From the vantage point of the history of Singapore medical development, these antiquated medical objects and equipment are bearers of the enduring testimonies of the hospital's pioneering spirit.

Our Roots

In the early days, Singapore General Hospital (SGH) was commonly known to Singaporeans as See Pai Poh, or the hospital on the hill, a place where people can go to seek medical care available to all.



The Beginning of a General Hospital

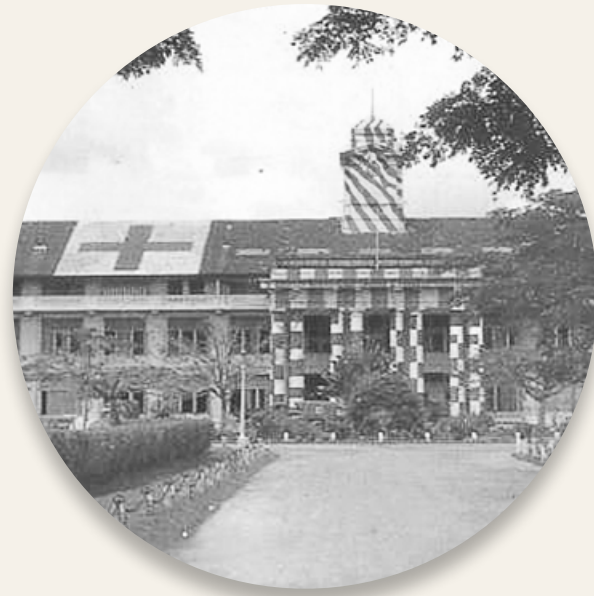
SGH had humble beginnings in 1821, when it first started as a wooden shed, highlighting the milestones and defining moments as she developed into a premier hospital.

On 29 March 1926, the hospital's modern history began with the opening of 800 beds and it became a public medical institution open to locals.

Windows to Our Past

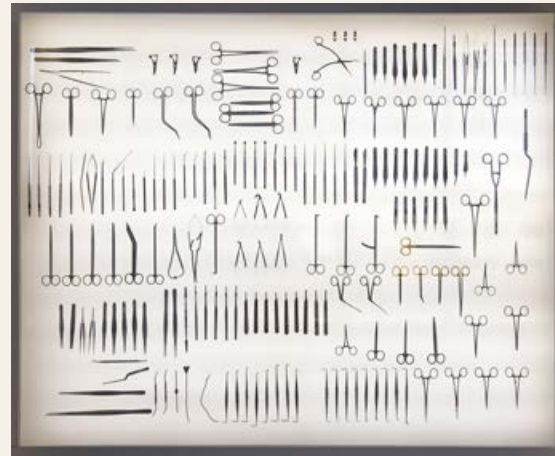
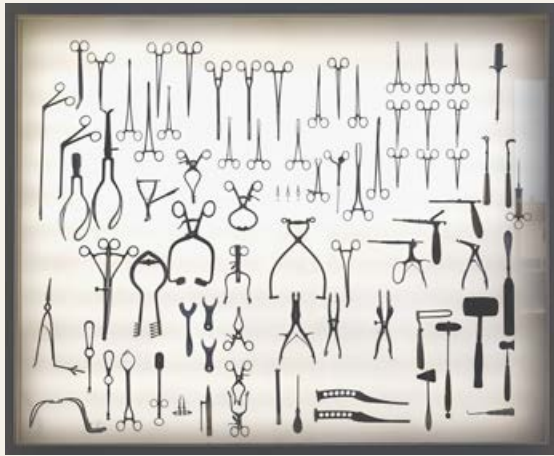
On display are the antiquated equipment which were significant to the medical specialties in Singapore.

Our Alma Mater

Medical and nursing education in Singapore traced its roots to SGH. The King Edward VII College of Medicine was a storehouse of memories of those who have taught and studied there.

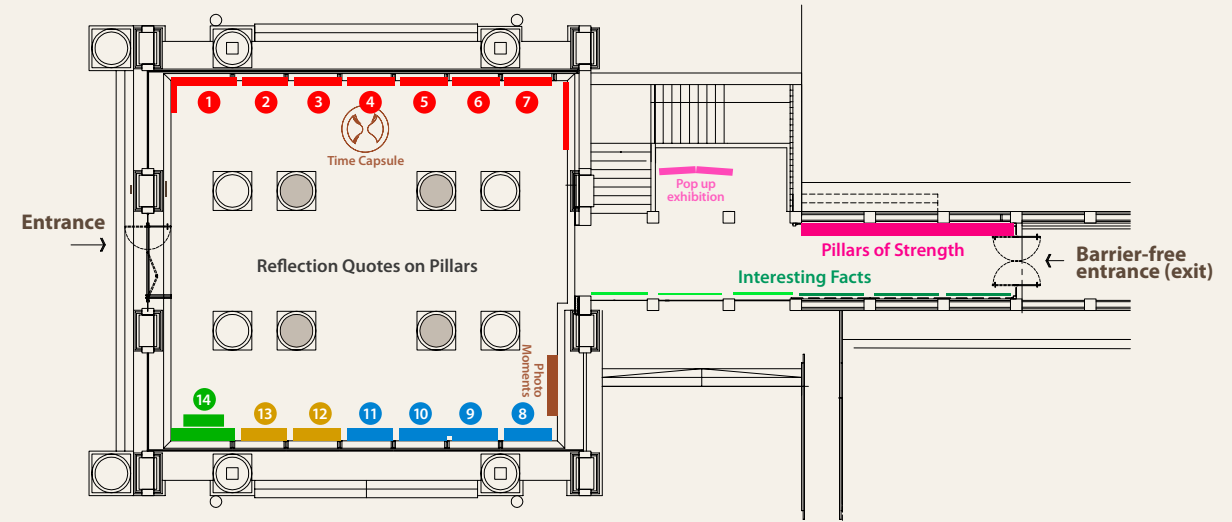




Tools of the Trade – Objet d’art
