


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Umbilical Artery Catheter Insertion

What is an umbilical artery catheter?

An umbilical artery catheter (UAC) is a small tube which is put into the artery of the umbilical cord stump (belly button).



Why does my baby need a UAC?

Many babies in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) have a UAC. A UAC helps in:

- Drawing blood samples
- Administering intravenous fluids
- Monitoring blood pressure
- Exchange transfusions (exchange of blood to treat severe jaundice)

How is it done?

- The baby will be placed on his back.
- The catheter will be carefully put into the artery.
- The catheter will be stitched and taped securely to the baby's belly button so that it cannot be pulled out.
- An X-ray will be taken to make sure the catheter is in the right place. Sometimes adjustments are made following the x-ray.

There are always risks with any medical procedure.

Some of the risks include:

- Bleeding
- Infection
- Blood clots formation
- Perforation/puncture of the artery
- Reduced blood supply to certain parts of the body

The doctors and nurses will take all the necessary precautions to ensure that your baby's risks are minimal.

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
