My Child's Developmental Guide

Gross Motor

- Lifts head when lying on tummy (2-4 months)
- Holds head steadily when carried upright (3-5 months)
- Sits supported with hands on floor/legs (4-5 months)
- Rolls from back to tummy (4-6 months)
- Sits unsupported for about 2-3 seconds (5-6 months)

Follows an object past midline (2-3 months)

Fine Motor and Vision

- Grasps rattle in hand for few seconds (3-5 months)
- Reaches and grabs toy (4-6 months)

Language and Hearing

- Looks towards sound (1-3 months)
- Makes cooing, gurgling sounds (2-3 months)



0 to 6 Months

Personal Social

- Social smile (1-2 months)
- Becomes more communicative and expressive with the face and body movement (2-4 months)
- Explores with hands and mouth (5-6 months)



Activities you can do with your child



- Cuddle, talk and play with your baby during feeding, dressing and bathing.
- · Supervised tummy time, at least 1 hour after feeding.
- Hold a toy or rattle in front of your baby and encourage him to reach for it.
- Place your baby on a floor mat so that he has ample space to roll and play.
- Read books with repetitive words or interesting rhymes and rhythms aloud with emotion.
- Talk, sing or make sounds about what you are doing or what your baby is showing interest in.



- · Avoid using mittens when your baby is awake to allow him to practise opening and closing hands.
- · Avoid use of screen media other than video-chatting.

Flag out when your child



- · Seems floppy or stiff.
- Does not startle to loud noises.
- · Does not track moving objects with the eyes.
- · Does not smile at familiar people at 3-4 months.
- Does not bring his hands towards mouth.
- · Does not roll over in either direction at 6 months.
- Does not hold his head when being pulled to sitting position.
- Does not lift his head up when lying on his stomach.
- Cannot sit supported for about 2-3 seconds by 5 months.
